






## THE HOPE PROJECT

Hope Stone's mindful arts education outreach program serves children and adults in their schools and facilities through arts classes taught by professional artists. Over 700 students (95% economically disadvantaged) in 7 schools/organizations receive classes in music, theater, dance, photography, digital arts, and sewing/fashion design.



700 students
7 community partners
1,305 classes a year
62 classes a week

"Our children have experienced ongoing serious trauma in their lives. This is often manifested in their behavior as short attention span, needing chaos for normalcy, and not being able to self-regulate. Your team provides structure with expectations for the children, which helps the children learn self-regulation. Including the families with a dance showing helped the children exhibit their new skills and gave value to the parents being involved. I witnessed tears of joy and surprise at what their children could accomplish."

"It was wonderful to see Hope Stone's commitment to us during the pandemic when in-person classes were not possible. They stayed committed to us, always asking, 'What can we do to help? Through the generous support of donors and foundations and in partnership with Stages, Hope Stone created and filmed during the pandemic a robust digital arts library called "smART breaks."

This fun series of 34 music, dance, and theater classes are introduced by two longtime friends – Captain Hope and Mr. Zo – who have just moved from Nice, CA to Houston, TX. Settled into their new home at Stages, they invite their teaching artist friends and neighbors over to teach classes.

This joyful and engaging programming gives students



the opportunity to experience movement, play music, and use their voices.






## FINANCIAL REVIEW


### **REVENUES**
